So, for us it is important to know the fundamentals of our faith, and what we base those fundamentals on.

It is generally accepted that there was a beginning to life on earth. Science talks of the Big Bang, then there are the thoughts of Evolution, Natural selection and other theories that have brought us to where we are today.

THE SAINTS OF LOVE



As soon as you mention "14th February" many people will immediately say, "Ah yes, St. Valentines Day."

My brother was unlucky enough to have been born on this special day and accepted some teasing throughout his teenage years receiving cards from unknown "girlfriends" ... often my mum, grandma and once or twice me.



St Valentine is known as the patron saint of lovers,

epileptics and beekeepers and he became a martyr for upholding the importance of love and marriage. According to legend, St. Valentine signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and healed from blindness. Another common legend says that he defied the emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war, only single men were chosen to become soldiers.



In contrast, maybe people don't know of, or celebrate another Saint of love and lovers. Saint Dwynwen, whose day is celebrated throughout Wales on the 25th of January.

Dwynwen lived in the fifth century, the daughter of a Welsh king, Brychan. Dwynwen fell in love with and wanted to marry Maelon, the son of another king. Her father had already arranged for her to marry someone else. So Dwynwen ran to the forest, distraught, praying to God to release her from love. Legend has it that an angel gave her a potion to make her forget about

- **Finally**, she wished that she would never be married.


