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#### **HOW DO UKRAINIANS CELEBRATE EASTER?**

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In Loughborough we are blessed to have a wonderful Christian bookshop owned by a Ukrainian lady called Liubov. When the Russians first invaded Ukraine, Liubov and her husband responded to the call to host people fleeing from Ukraine, by offering to take seven people to stay with them. They have a four bedroom house, but seven people are very grateful for the amazing hospitality offered to them in the Lords name. I asked Liubov how Easter traditions in Ukraine differed from our own.

Easter is known as Velykden' (The **Great Day) in Ukraine.** Easter - as well as Christmas and the Pentecost - is usually celebrated for three days. These are holy days and usually most people don't do any work. Special Easter services are held in churches and many families celebrate the day with a special Easter meal. Easter meals traditionally include the Paskha (a tall, sweet loaf of Easter bread, similar to Italian panettone) and a lot of brightly coloured boiled eggs. The bread symbolises Christ who is our Bread of Life (cf. 1 Cor. 5:7) and the eggs represent new life and the resurrection of Christ. The Orthodox

Ukrainians would take these symbols of Easter to church for a priest to consecrate them. At sunrise there would be a procession carrying the cross which circles around the church three times. The journey is made to symbolise the trip of the women to the tomb to anoint the body of Christ on that first **Easter morning.** After the third passage, the procession stops in front of the church doors, which symbolize the impossibility of being able to enter the Kingdom of God before the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The priest sings the joyful Easter song "Khrystos Voskres" ("Christ is Risen"), then everyone greets each other with the same greeting, "Khrystos Voskres", and the others answer "Voistinu Voskres" ("He has risen indeed").

After Easter lunch, children would often play a game involving Easter eggs. There are many variations of the game. The simplest one would be to see whose eggs are the strongest. A child tries to crack an gg of another child and the last remaining un-cracked egg would win over all the eggs that had cracked. The winner is allowed to take all the cracked eggs home to demonstrate their victory.

Ukrainian artists - as well as artists of other Slavic cultures - have a springtime tradition of decorating their Easter eggs with complex geometric designs using beeswax. This art form is called *pysanka*. The word, *pysanka* is derived from the Ukrainian verb *pysaty*, which means "to write." The geometric forms on the eggs are imbued with meaning, for instance triangles represents the Holy Trinity, etc. With the right care, a pysanka can last a long time, years even. Happy Easter!

Ultimately their prayer is that they can tell men and women about the God who loves them and who made these beautiful creatures for them to love and care for. They have seen many lives changed as people trust the One who created the animals and have come to know Him as their Saviour.

## THIS SERIES OF STUDIES IS BEING PREPARED FROM A BOOKLET ENTITLED "READ MARK LEARN"

Study number five—Mark chapter 2:13-28 (Please read)

PRESSING ON

Today's reading contains quite a mixture of incidents, but you can pick out several important points as you press on in your Christian lives.

First we see -

obedience. As soon as Jesus called him, Levi "got up and followed him" (verse 14). He could never have guessed what lay ahead but he was prepared to trust Jesus for every step of life's journey, whatever the cost. We know that Levi took his gift of writing (he was a tax collector) and consecrated it to the Lord's service, eventually writing the first book in the New Testament. You too have special gifts and abilities (see Ephesians 4 verse 7). Make sure that they are available for use in God's service.

Then we see -

**OPPOSITION.** The Scribes and Pharisees criticised Jesus for mixing with people they classed as undesirables (*verse 16*). His answer was that He had not come to call those who felt that they were already good enough (*verse 17*).

Then the disciples were criticised for not fasting (*verse 18*). Jesus answered that for His disciples to be mournful while He was with them was as unthinkable as for special guests to be miserable at a wedding (*verse 19*). The Christian life is meant to be a life of joy. Look up Romans 14 verse 17 and Philippians 4 verse 4.

And then we see -

observance Verses 23 to 28 deal with Sunday observance. There were many traditional Jewish laws about the Sabbath, many of them quite ridiculous. For instance, some Pharisees taught that it was sinful to pick a single ear of corn on that day! Jesus cut across all these regulations by saying "the Sabbath was made for man..." (v. 27); but note what He added in verse 28! God has given you one day in seven as a special day of rest and worship. Look up Christs own example in Hebrews 10 verse 25. Make sure that you spend God's day in God's way!

"Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it Holy" (Exodus 20:8)

## Simnel Cakes

Simnel cakes have been known since at least medieval times. Bread regulations of the time suggest they were boiled and then baked, a technique which led to an invention (around since the 18th century) whereby a mythical couple, Simon and Nelly, fall out over making a Simnel. One wishes to boil it, one to bake it and, after beating each other with various household implements, they compromise on one which uses both cooking techniques.

Simnel cake is a fruitcake widely eaten in the United Kingdom, Ireland, associated with Lent and Easter. It is distinguished by layers of almond paste or marzipan, typically one in the middle and one on top, and a set of eleven balls made of the same paste. It was originally traditionally made for the fourth Sunday in Lent – Mothering Sunday



(when the 40-day fast would be relaxed and the custom of live-in apprentices and domestic servants going home to visit their mothers on Mothering Sunday started, checking that their families were well and taking food or money if needed. This was a time of year when food stocks were low, and the high-calorie simnel cake was useful nutrition). It is now more frequently eaten on Easter Sunday.

Different towns had their own recipes and style of the Simnel cake, but the recipe usually includes white flour, spices dried fruit and candied peel.

Sometimes orange flower water is used in the cake mix or to flavour the almond paste.

Marzipan or almond paste is

used as a filling in the cake and as a decoration on top.
Conventionally, 11 marzipan balls are used to decorate the cake, symbolising the 12 apostles, minus Judas. Sometimes 12 are used, representing Jesus and the 11 apostles. Nowadays people sometimes add small sugar Easter eggs and /or chick decorations as symbols of new life.

Just where the daffodil got its name is unclear. The name is possibly derived from the Old English word "affodyle", which means "that which comes early" or "early comer". This makes sense, given the way the flower usually blooms early.

The yellow daffodil is the most popular of all daffodils. It is the trumpet that announces the arrival of spring. Yellow daffodil is the one that blooms right after the winter and some people say that the daffodil is the herald of the spring. It announces to the other plants and flowers that the spring has arrived and that's why it's shaped like a trumpet. So, a positive daffodil meaning is good news.

The meaning of daffodil flower is also symbolic to the **Warsaw Ghetto Uprising**, which was the largest Jewish uprising during World War II.

Every year on April 19th, the revolt is honoured and many wear yellow paper daffodils to show their respect. Daffodils are another frequent bloom found around Easter.

**In China**, daffodils are symbols of good fortune and prosperity.

**In Japan**, they symbolise joy and mirth.

**In France**, daffodils are symbols of hope.

The daffodil is of course the **national flower of Wales** and the symbol of a number of cancerrelated charities around the world.

We recognise that the beautiful poem, "I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud" by William Wordsworth, was inspired by a walk with his sister Dorothy in April of 1802. They came across a vast array of daffodils as they wandered in the forest.

You may not 'wander lonely as a cloud' but may you be encouraged to look afresh at the daffodils and reflect on all that they might teach us.


That's why, on a cold, breezy, rainy day, the planned daily outing delivered us into Bristol for a few hours, to explore it's delights. We

The Rev Dr Michael Ipgrave has announced that the project to consider these theological questions will begin in the Spring and continue for FIVE years! I wonder how much that will cost!


Interestingly, back in 2018, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, very wisely said "God is not male or female. God is not definable."

It plays a vital role in the life of the nation, proclaiming the Christian gospel in words and actions and providing services of Christian worship and praise.
