THIS SERIES OF STUDIES IS BEING PREPARED FROM A BOOKLET ENTITLED "READ MARK LEARN"

Study number 2 — Mark chapter 1 verses 12-28 (Please read)

Three Great Possessions

This passage includes the calling of the first disciples and a remarkable incident at Capernaum, but let us concentrate on just one verse and notice three great possessions which are now ours as Christians. In verse 17 we will find first of all -

A Person to Follow. Jesus found Simon (Peter) and his brother Andrew by the lakeside and commanded them "come follow me". Immediately they turned their backs on everything else and followed Him and were never the same again! Now that He has called us to Himself let us be determined to follow Jesus, and to make Him our Pattern, our Standard and our Guide in every part of our lives. Secondly, notice that the verse also speaks of -

A Power to Fashion. Jesus went on "and I will make you fishers of men". What power Jesus has! Power to create (John 1 v 3); power to cure (Matthew 8 v 3); Power to control (Luke 8 v 24); but above all, power to change men's lives. Because Jesus now lives within us by His Holy

Spirit, this power is now ours and is sufficient to deal with all our problems. The Bible says, "It is God who works in you to will and to act according to His good purpose". (Philippians 2 v 3). Thirdly, notice at the end of the verse there is -

A Purpose To Fulfil "I will make you fishers of men". It is a marvellous thing to know that God has a pattern and a purpose for our lives, and we can be sure that we will gradually see it working out as we follow Him daily. Whatever that purpose might be, there is no doubt that it includes being a "fisher of men". Don't be ashamed of our Saviour and pray now that He will use us to draw others to Him. See that you commend the Lord Jesus to others, not only by what you say, but by how you live. Matthew 5 v 6 puts it perfectly. "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness for they will be filled".

"Let us fix our eyes on Jesus the author and perfector of our faith".

(Hebrews12 v 2)

News From Mandritsara

Griffydam church has a strong affiliation with the Good News Hospital, and following is an article recently written for Contact by our brother Nathan, who is currently working there.

Tonga soa, bienvenu and WELCOME to the Good News Hospital in Mandritsara, Madagascar.

I'm sure it's been a long trip, but you've finally made it to the North-East Corner of Madagascar and it's my pleasure to welcome you! Why don't you unpack and settle into the Oasis guesthouse whilst I tell you about the hospital...

We're out here serving the 250,000 people of Mandritsara District (and others who've come from furtherafield!) offering life saving medical care and holding out the lifechanging gospel of Jesus Christ to anyone who walks through the gate. He came to seek and save the lost (Luke 19:10) and these really are the lost: a poor region of a poor country. As you'll have seen on

your journey, most of the people of this district are subsistence rice farmers, only a minority of whom would have more than primarylevel education. As you can imagine, medically the needs are enormous: our inpatient/paediatric team are fighting a running battle against rampant malaria, tuberculosis, malnutrition and typhoid, whilst the maternity ward sees about 200 life-saving caesarean sections a year. Our surgical colleagues meanwhile are dealing with pretty much everything under the sun, from tumours to trauma (injuries from cattle horns being a particular problem!) and the eye department remove dozens of cataracts every month to give people their sight back. All of which we do for as little cost as we can to the patients, although it's simply not possible to do everything completely free of charge.

Wrapped up with all that medical activity though is a living breathing

gospel work- three Malagasy pastors employed as an evangelism team co-ordinate a series of gospel talks on the wards and in outpatients every morning, and we're doing our best to keep alive the vision of an every-member ministry where everyone from the chief of medicine to the lab technicians has their eyes and ears open to the Spirit's prompting to share stories of Iesus and His call to repent as well as medical advice with their patients. Nothing's forced, no-one's pressured into believing, but almost everyone will have the chance to hear the gospel at some point, and for all our sin and weaknesses and limitations, it really is medicine AND mission that we're doing...

Anyhoo, sorry, I'm rambling on! Will let you unpack and then we can take the tour...!

Recipe from the



little **sunn**ykitchen

Ingredients

□**60 grams powdered sugar** but this depends on how sweet you like them, if you in general like sweet cookies, then add 40 more grams.

□125 grams ghee/butter

□250 grams all-purpose flour

□pistachios

Instructions

First you need to mix the ghee/butter with the powdered sugar by hand. Then add the flour to the mixture and mix until it's well combined. The dough should be nice and soft and should not stick to your hands.

Place the dough ball into a bowl, cover with a plastic wrap, and refrigerate for about 1 hour.

After you take it out of the refrigerator, let it rest for 15 minutes. Gently knead the dough for a few seconds and start shaping dough balls (each should approximately weight about 6 grams), place it on wax paper on a baking tray, flatten it using your hand and press a pistachio into each cookie.

Bake in a preheated oven at 150c for 10-15 minutes (but this depends on what kind of oven do you use, when done the bottom of the cookies should be golden in colour but be careful as these cookies burn very easily).

Make sure you give the cookies enough time to cool down because they're very delicate and are easy to break.

Notes:

Ghee may be substituted with clarified butter at its solid state.

Store in a box (not airtight container) at room temperature for up to 2 weeks.
